2023 Helen Everett Honoree Pam Cavanagh

"I loved teaching above all else," said Pam Cavanagh, when we talked about her love of the library and her years of teaching literature and writing to local high school students.

Pam Ford Cavanagh is this year's recipient of HLF's prestigious Helen Everett Award. As a former HLF board member, with deep generational ties in Humboldt County, Pam has been dedicated to the world of books and learning throughout her life. She was a much beloved English teacher at Arcata High School for sixteen years,

where she approached her students with respect and a determination to teach critical thinking and writing skills. Her main goal was to infuse students with confidence in themselves and help them to write and speak clearly. She approached her work with a quiet but fierce belief in the importance of teaching young people to search for the truth and think on their own.

Pam was born and raised in Humboldt County. She left home to attend college in Missouri and Colorado, where she initially taught high school English for one year. Then life's journey took her in other directions, where she held a variety of interesting jobs, including editor, log scaler and bookkeeper with the family business. Motherhood then took precedence, with three wonderful children. It wasn't until many years later that she secured her secondary teaching credential at Humboldt State University and joyfully recounted, "the planets were aligned, when at the age of 47, I was hired to teach at Arcata High School."

Pam served as a member of the HLF Board 2014-2018, where her passion for the mission and exceptional organizational skills helped grow the Foundation. She has been involved in community service for many years, from 4-H to Soroptimists. She served on the board for the local Planned Parenthood and currently serves on the board for the Eureka Symphony. She continues to be active in the family business, helping to manage the extensive holdings of the Lawrence Ford and Son Ranch Company.

Please join us in honoring Pam Cavanagh for her dedication to growing young minds and for her enduring commitment to literature, books and the library.

We returned from Portugal and Paris last month, and my impressions are still vivid – Gothic Cathedrals, museums galore, the Douro River valley, botanical gardens, opera and jazz in Paris, fabulous food and so much more.

However, the wrinkle as a traveler is that you are a guest -- not invited to sit at the family table. There is the occasional taxi driver eager to enlighten, or a shopkeeper ready to exchange views, but animated conversation at the sidewalk café is not in the cards. That aside, one finds consolation in the familiar, in the many small bookshops in Porto and in Paris, and public libraries bustling with kids and families.

Literary pilgrims were in abundance, too. In Porto, you need a timed ticket to get inside the Livraria Lello, the **bookstore that inspired J.K. Rowling's** *Harry Potter* series. The building is an art nouveau concoction, replete with stained glass, a winding keyhole staircase, and hundreds of Potterites in line. In Paris, there were throngs of people gathered outside Shakespeare & Company, the expat bookstore established by Sylvia Beach. It, too, is a magnet for lovers of literature. These were pilgrims who came to touch the idea of the book.

But touching is not possible in the world-famous University of Coimbra Library in Portugal. Considered one of the most beautiful libraries in the world, the baroque edifice holds rare volumes from the 16th, 17th, and 18th centuries. You need a ticket to get in, no photographs are allowed, and resident bats protect the ancient books from bugs.

Unraveling history is one of travel's great rewards. Place dictated my reading choices, and I had prepared with old favorites: Janet Flanner's Paris Was Yesterday tucked into my suitcase; a revisit to David McCullough's The Greater Journey, Americans in Paris; and Edmund deWaal's Letters to Camondo.

An exhibit in Porto, celebrating the 650th anniversary of the alliance between England and Portugal, set me on a path towards the Napoleonic Wars with a quick read of *Sharpe's Havoc* by Bernard Cornwell. I was there in Porto with the armies of Wellington and Napolean in 1807, rocky terrain under my feet, villages and river gorge traversed. Perfect. For a more serious look the 2014 biography, *Napolean*, *A Life*, by Andrew Roberts, merits attention.

It was a wonderful journey, replete with stories to tell, enriched by discovery – "there is no other happiness quite the same."

- number over 12,000 cardholders. Books and materials purchased will be circulated throughout the Humboldt County Library system that includes the Main, ten branch libraries and the book-mobile, which serves fourteen outlying communities.

The Humboldt County Library would like to congratulate Ronda Wittenberg on her retirement after 52 years of service in support of the Library and its programs. I have worked with Ronda off and on for over 22 of those years, including three especially rewarding years doing restorative work together. I have deep appreciation and respect for Ronda and her contributions in helping HCL evolve and our patrons and I will miss her very much.



Ronda moved to Humboldt County in the Summer of 1969 and



continued her education at College of the Redwoods and Humboldt State University. Ronda began her library career with the Eureka City Free Library in January 1971, as a Page/Clerk working 20 hours a week at what is considered today to be extra-help.

It was on April 2, 1972, that she became a permanent, full-time benefited employee and just prior to the Eureka City Library and Humboldt County Library consolidation on July 1, 1972, which became the Humboldt County Library system.

Over the years, Ronda has served titles in multiple roles: Page, Clerk, Intermediate Clerk, Circulation Supervisor, Circulation Manager, Library Division Manager, Acting Library Director and now Library Operations Manager. Ronda refers to it as a slow and steady migration upward.

For over 25 years, she served as the Department's Volunteer Coordi-

nator. Ronda coordinated, planned and promoted the annual Volunteer Appreciation Day event. She worked several years as an active committee member of the Children's Author Festival, chairing the committee twice. Ronda also served as chairperson for the Celebration of Humboldt County Authors.

It has been an honor for me to work closely with Ronda as a colleague, and to collaborate with HCL staff on library development projects. 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HLF Presents \$100,000 Grant to Humboldt Libraries

The Humboldt Library Foundation (HLF) presented the Humboldt County Library system over \$100,000 in grants to purchase new books, ebooks, graphic novels and continued access to language learning resources.

"On behalf of the library staff I want to thank the Humboldt Library Foundation for their generosity and commitment to providing dynamic and relevant resources to the library community," said Library Director Chris Cooper. "Readers of all ages will be grateful for the vibrant expansion of the graphic novel collection."

HLF Board President Elizabeth Murguia said, "These annual contributions continue to be pivotal to our local Library system and it's all thanks to our generous donors. We continue to be amazed by the level of support we receive from the community as we work to keep the library open and relevant for years to come."

This grant funding includes re-envisioning the Library's graphic novel and manga collection with the opening of a dedicated section to the genre and an expansion of new materials. Once the domain of superhero comic books and newspaper dailies, comics have become their own legitimate format, winning Caldecotts, Newberys, Coretta Scott King Awards, Hugo Awards and even Pulitzer Prizes. This new expansion is another example of the library remaining responsive and relevant to patrons old and new. Subscriptions to Mango Languages will also be supported for another year with this funding, in addition to a significant physical and ebook expansion.

"The Foundation's support is vital to our Library collection, providing up-to-date, useful and popular books & AV," said Acquisitions and Technical Services Manager Michael Logan. "This year, we're especially thrilled to give "graphic narratives" (comics, manga, graphic novels/nonfiction, etc.) their own separate and unique section. The Foundation's generous support guarantees a huge new infusion of titles to inaugurate what's sure to be an extremely popular collection. This is huge, and it wouldn't have happened without the HLF."
