Annual Holiday Gala, December 6, 2010 Helen Everett Award Recipients Michele McKeegan and Ed Olsgard

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The directors of the Humboldt Library Foundation are pleased to announce they have selected long-time HLF supporters Michele McKeegan and Ed Olsgard to receive this year's Helen Everett Award. They are dedicated community volunteers and long-time advocates for the public library system in Humboldt County.

Michele got involved in the library when the capital campaign for the new building was started. She met with capital campaign volunteer Sally Upatisringa to get a better idea of what was planned. She and Sally talked about how they would bring stacks of books home from the library when they were kids. Michele says she adored the Freddie the pig stories such as *Freddie the Detective* and *Freddie Goes Camping*. She has introduced her great-nephew to the Freddie books and he loves them too. Today, she's reading books in French so she can learn a new language.

Michele retired from Planned Parenthood in 1992 but still stays active as a volunteer and fundraiser. "I'm active in the community

because I see things that need to happen and know that I can help make them happen," she said.

Ed is a physician at Eureka Family Practice and works with Planned Parenthood. He also traces his love and respect for public libraries back to his childhood. A new library was built about 1960 in Minneapolis that had a planetarium. He saw his first planetarium show there. It also had listening rooms where he listened to Vaughn Williams' symphonies and read the scores along with the music.

"Anyone with a card could do all these activities and it opened up a world of cultural exposure that formed me as a kid and continues today," he said. "To me, one measure of a civilized community is the presence of a public library," he added. Ed says he finds movies and books at the Humboldt County Library that he can't find anywhere else. He likes to read history and political biography and occasionally a novel. Ed keeps the sonnets of Shakespeare and the Decameron at his bedside.

The Helen Everett Award was established to recognize individuals or organizations whose contributions improve the quality of public library services in Humboldt County. Michele and Ed are the 12th and 13th recipients. They will be honored at the HLF Annual Holiday Gala which will be held Monday, December 6, 2010, at Baywood Golf & Country Club. LOCAL AUTHOR'S CORNER—RAY RAPHAEL



Ray Raphael has changed the way we think about the American Revolution emerging over the last decade as one of our leading writers on the birth of the United States of America. In 2001 his <u>People's History of the American Revolution</u> told the story of the ordinary people not generally present in tales of our nation's founding. In 2002 <u>The First American Revolution</u>: <u>Before Lexington and Concord</u> caught the attention of academic historians and has influenced the way the Revolution is taught in our colleges and universities. In 2004 his <u>Founding Myths</u>: <u>Stories that Hide Our Patriotic Past</u> established new standards for all future renderings of our nation's birth. His current, groundbreaking book, <u>Founders</u>: <u>The People Who Brought You a Nation</u>, incorporates all his work in an original synthesis.

In the 1970s he homesteaded in the hills of southern Humboldt County, where he and his wife Marie raised their two sons, Nick and Neil. He taught a comprehensive one-room high school in his remote home as well as evening courses at the local community college, and he began writing about local history and contemporary issues.

In his first book, <u>An Everyday History of Somewhere</u>, Raphael relied extensively on oral histories. In subsequent works dealing with topics of local and regional importance (<u>Edges</u>, <u>Tree Talk</u>, <u>Cash Crop</u>), he adapted this oral history approach, weaving his own narrative around the stories of real people as told in their own words. His treatment of more general topics (<u>Teachers' Voice</u>, <u>Men from the Boys</u>) likewise relied on in-depth interviews, faithfully rendered. <u>Little White Father</u>, a historical piece, made extensive use of primary documents. He wrote a play on John and Jessie Fremont, which toured various towns in Northern California, and a one-act called "Your Life is Your Art," performed at his fiftieth birthday. With his son Neil, then 12 years old, he wrote a juvenile mystery called <u>Comic Cops</u>. Locally, he is sometimes referred to as the "Studs Terkel" of Northwest California.

In the early 1990s, while preparing curriculum for his United States history courses, he became keenly interested in the history of common people during the American Revolution. Stimulated by a year-long grant from the National Endowment of the Humanities, he traveled to East Coast archives to pursue his passion. Since that time he has been hooked on the Revolution and the nation's founding, with all its historic, philosophical, and political implications. A recent survey conducted by the Humboldt County Library reveals that the libraries are busier than ever – even after significant budget cuts. Total circulation has increased from nearly 675,000 volumes in 2008-09 to nearly 696,000 in 2009-10. Reference questions rose by 2,000 and borrowers have increased by over 5,000. All of this accomplished even though system-wide public service was reduced by 723 hours.
