

Annual Holiday Gala, December 3, 2012 HELEN EVERETT AWARD RECIPIENTS BILL & GRACE GREENWOOD

You could say that Bill and Grace Greenwood were brought together by a love of books and libraries. They met and fell in love one summer while Bill was attending Oregon State University (OSU) and Grace was up from San Jose State College to attend a summer session. Inspired by that memory, and a profound belief in the importance of education, decades later they were proud to provide financial support for a new library at OSU.



Bill and Grace have promoted libraries and education in every community they've lived. Volunteering, training library docents and setting up the elementary school library where Grace taught, they simply believed that libraries strengthened the fabric of family life. They raised their three children to share their love of a good book and the importance of lifelong learning.

Bill grew up on a farm in rural Oregon and fondly remembers that by the 3rd grade he was inspired by the beautiful Corvallis Library, which was designed by the renowned architect Pietro Belluschi. "It was beautiful. I lived in that library," said Bill. He devoured the classics and was fascinated by books about building and architecture. It inspired him to achieve a degree in mechanical engineering and a lifelong career in the aerospace industry.

Grace (Avick) Greenwood was born and raised in Humboldt County. She lived with her family in Bayside and loved visiting the local library. She was inspired to become a teacher and went on to attain a Masters Degree with an emphasis on teaching reading skills.

The Greenwoods moved to Humboldt County in 1996 following Bill's retirement from the aerospace industry in 1988, where, by his own account, he became a professional volunteer.

Bill is a former board member of the Humboldt Library Foundation and served on the Humboldt Senior Resource Advisory Council. An advocate and tireless fundraiser, Bill was a key participant in the effort to build the new Alzheimer's Resource Center in Eureka. He actively supports the Eureka Symphony and has taught AARP driver safety for the past 14 years. Grace is an active member of AAUW and PEO, raising scholarship funds and promoting higher education.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK by Elizabeth Murguia



"I can never get enough about knowing about other people's lives." William Maxwell

I've dipped into *What There is To Say We Have Said*, a collection of letters between Eudora Welty and her New Yorker editor, William Maxwell. My admiration of Welty and follow-up to visiting her home in Jacksonville Mississippi last year, has been rich reading experience. Unfortunately, the Suzanne Marres biography of Welty was not that satisfying, but certainly enough to keep me reading. This is odd voyeurism that old English majors indulge – apparently when we finish with their fiction, we wade on into their lives. I've not read any of Maxwell's writing – novels, essays or short stories, but from the quote above and surely from his letters to Eudora, I gather we may have a future relationship.

Maxwell's observation could well have been the theme of the 'Book-y Luncheon' I joined with friends in Florida a few months back. A reinvention of the over-worked book group model, these lovers of books get together twice a year and share book recommendations. Lively discussion spawned more book recommendations than you can imagine. I've been plowing through the list, and it has been fun, taking me away from a preoccupation with history and non-fiction.

Louise Erdrich's, *The Round House* is beautifully written. A haunting story that digs deep into the contradiction of the Native American experience -- dependence on using the law as redress to the historic denial of rights. It is also a compelling coming of age story for the young son of a tribal member who is violently assaulted. It eerily coincided with the national debate over expanding the Violence Against Women Act and those provisions unique to tribal lands.

I discovered a new author, Nancy Turner, who has written a series on pioneer life and settlement of the Arizona Territories. An easy read and probably an area on US western history, if like me, you haven't read about: These Is My Words and Star Garden. There were also selections on memory and history and how the individual interprets these forces. In turn, both Julian Barnes The Sense of an Ending (winner of the Man Booker Prize) and Sarah Blake's The Postmistress tug at my own use of personal myth and memoir. And the immigrant story is vividly wrought in Julie Otsuka's Buddah in the Attic, written with the simplicity and beauty of a Japanese brush stroke but portraying the stark experience of young women brought to the shores of America for a new life, where forces of history lead them to the internment camps of the barren deserts of northern California.

Finally, after a recent visit to Washington DC and the historic Ford's Theater, I picked Elizabeth Keckly's *Behind the Scenes, or Thirty Years a Slave, and Four Years in the White House.* For Lincoln devotees, this is the 'tell-all' book written by Mary Todd Lincoln's dressmaker, first published 1868. Fascinating as both an insider look at the White House but also the remarkable life experience of a slave woman who bought her own freedom.

2012 HOLIDAY GALA




HLF SUMMER AUTHORS LECTURE SERIES



The Trinidad Library will open in Spring 2013. To make sure there are enough new books on the shelves to match the thrill of flinging open the doors, HLF recently donated \$2,000. This is an HLF Challenge Grant, designed to maximize resources at local branch libraries by encouraging matching grant opportunities.

The dream of a permanent library for Trinidad has been alive for nearly a century. The Trinidad Civic Club established the first lending library in the town in 1915 in a shed near the corner of West and Trinity. Without a permanent home, over the years the collection has moved around town to the Presbyterian Church, a Trinidad Elementary School classroom, and a former kitchen at the annex of City Hall.

In 2000, the Trinidad Branch was faced with finding yet another temporary location, and support swelled for a permanent building. Glen and Janis Saunders initiated the process by donating the land and making a very generous pledge to start the building. Over 130 "Founding Families" and businesses donated \$500 or more. HLF contributed \$2,000 to the building fund. Friends of the Trinidad Library (FOTL) have worked continuously on fundraising — they are now within \$35,000 of their goal of \$450,000.


